Dr. Graham Cope then spoke about the Grand Old Duke of York and Mary Anne Clarke. Mary used her feminine charms to rise in society becoming the duke's mistress. She used her influence over him to secure commissions in the army for which she received payment. Having been abandoned by him, she helped the Whig MP Colonel Gwyllym Wardle in giving evidence that he too had financially benefitted. Although acquitted, his reputation was damaged and he lost his position as Commander in Chief of the Army. Mary threats to publish more secrets resulted in government pay offs and she lived a good life abroad. The Duke, Frederick was reinstated as Commander in Chief when his brother came to the throne and was very highly thought of due to the welfare reforms he introduced. He is remembered in the well-known nursery rhyme. Wardle ended up in a debtor's prison before also going abroad.
